



Through drawing, sculpture, and interactive formats, she turns emotional patterns into visual stories, often mixing humour with heaviness. Her practice has evolved from intimate illustrations into object- and system-based works. Blending childlike elements with layered undertones, she brings unsaid scenarios into reality for the characters in her art.



Her work creates mysterious environments within architectural spaces, shaped by a surrealistic use of color, light, and shadow. Incorporating everyday objects, she evokes both familiarity and unease. Her recent practice draws inspiration from the shift in her living environment, exploring isolation in confined spaces.

Amandeep's practice lies at the intersection of observation, memory, and materiality. Working across photography, mixed media, and traditional techniques, he examines the quiet relationships between individuals and their environments, especially how everyday gestures and urban fragments reflect societal burdens. Beginning with spontaneous photographs in public spaces, he develops digital photomontages and large-scale works that translate into drawing, cyanotype, cement casting, or tempera painting. This layered process allows him to engage with memory as both a visual and multisensory experience.

ANIKET DEVGIRKAR

Aniket Devgirkar's project From Darkness to Truth emerges from a deeply personal experience yet addresses the widespread social issue of addiction. Rooted in his father's struggle with alcohol, the work reflects both private memory and a collective reality affecting many families in India, especially in rural and marginalized communities. Working across watercolour, oil, pastels, and sculpture, he explores layers of emotion and trauma. His practice becomes both personal healing and public awareness, urging reflection on this silent social crisis.

ANKANA SAHA

Ankana Saha's artistic vision revolves around reimagining vintage family photographs through manual hand-painting techniques. Using studio portraits with distinctive gestures and expressions as a base, she layers colors and textures to reveal hidden stories shaped by family history, social context, and environment. Focusing on worn and damaged photographs, she preserves imperfections, allowing time to become part of the narrative. Her works evoke nostalgia and curiosity, blending past and present while reflecting on memory's fragility and the power of storytelling.

ANKIT SOMVANSHI

Ankit Somvanshi works with paper pulp to explore organic materials, colors, and textures. He values its transformation from flexible to solid and often uses earth tones for their sensory qualities. His art draws from natural events and human impact on the environment, as well as insights gained through travel to places like Mumbai, Bhopal, Rajasthan, and Zargo. Beginning with found objects marked by time, he lets them inspire layered ideas that shape his experimental process.

ANUJ KUMAR MALLICK

Anuj Kumar Mallick's sculpture practice explores the connection between urban and rural life, shaped by his own roots in both worlds. Using natural materials like clay, terracotta, bamboo, and wood alongside metal and urban waste, he reflects on space, memory, identity, and transformation. Centering the human figure, his works express isolation, silence, and resistance amid migration and change. Inspired by artists such as Antony Gormley, Arun Kumar H.G., and Jitish Kallat, he creates dialogues between tradition and progress.

ANUVHAB MITRA

Anuvhab Mitra, born and raised in Amtala, South 24 Parganas, draws deep inspiration from rural Bengal. His work reflects village life—its people, animals, birds, and the political realities that shape daily existence. He primarily works with wood and bronze, occasionally using fiberglass as an alternative. With a focus on presenting village life on larger platforms, his art seeks to give audiences a clearer understanding of rural experiences often misperceived or overlooked by those in urban settings.

Appalabhathuni Hemalatha, an artist from Visakhapatnam, is currently pursuing her BFA at Andhra University, graduating in 2025. Each piece reflects the silent battles women face daily—the stares, pressures, and imposed roles. Through her art, she seeks to challenge perceptions and give voice to the emotional reality of being a woman in today's world.



Archi Jindal's artistic journey began with works on Indian law, later expanding to themes of animal cruelty during her time in Mumbai. Her art also reflects attachment to her hometown Bundi, portraying its history, beauty, and neglected architectural heritage. A travel enthusiast, she has worked on cultural themes from regions like Kashmir, Karnataka, Himachal, and Madhya Pradesh. Recently, she has embraced her love for rain, thunder, and Bundi's miniature painting forms, working primarily with terracotta as her chosen medium.

ARIJIT ROY

Arijit Roy is a research-based artist whose practice navigates the space between inquiry and expression, integrating history, ecology, anthropology, and philosophy. His investigative process uses fieldwork, archives, interviews, and theory as active media. Working across installations, painting, text, sound, and multiple techniques like watercolor, acrylic, papermaking, sculpture, and printmaking, he explores critical themes. One project revisits the 1859–60 Indigo Revolt in Bengal, using indigodyed paper, archival imagery, and folk poetry to reflect on rural resistance, systemic violence, and the memory of protest.

ARINDAM SINHA

Arindam Sinha's practice delves into the emotional and psychological realities of middle-class family life, drawing from personal experiences and surroundings. Using watercolour and influenced by the Wash technique of the Bengal School, he explores isolation, resilience, and mental health, often portraying himself and family members as central figures. His works, such as Forced and Allure Imagination, examine financial pressure, emotional distance, and psychological unrest. Through intimate narratives, he seeks to reveal hidden emotional landscapes and create space for reflection and empathy.

ASHA LALWANI

Asha Lalwani's artwork is rooted in nostalgic memories and expresses vibrant color, texture, and figurative abstraction. Her work explores relationships, hope, happiness, fantasy, and life, often using half-human, half-animal figures as symbols of humanity. Drawing inspiration from nature and human emotions, she reflects on the interplay between the natural world and inner feelings, creating pieces that resonate with both personal and universal experiences.

ASHLESHA RAVARIYA

Ashlesha Ravariya is a visual artist working in ceramics. Her practice involves creating intricate pieces that reflect personal experiences and explore memory, time, and life's unpredictability. Her largely autobiographical work references childhood memories and animal forms. The figures are often androgynous, with sexual characteristics de-emphasized, encouraging viewers to focus on their humanity and emotions. Through naturalistic forms and dramatic compositions, her art invites multiple interpretations, speaking broadly to shared human experiences.

ATISH SAHA

Atish Saha depicts drought and its effects through his artwork. His pieces capture the cracked, dry forms of soil and the harsh, arid conditions above ground. Working primarily with acrylic and real soil applied on canvas, he translates environmental realities into visual form, creating works that reflect both the severity of natural phenomena and their impact on the land.

ATISH KUNDU

Atish Kundu lives in a rural environment, observing various nets—fishing, mosquito, bird traps, and agricultural mesh—which inspire his work. In his paintings, nets serve not just as physical objects but as metaphors for consciousness, symbolizing protection, shelter, entrapment, control, and limitation. Using watercolor wash and other mediums, he explores these layered meanings, revealing the interconnections between nature, society, and the human psyche, and highlighting the complex relationship between rural life and the symbolic power of nets.

AVNISH UPALA

Avnish Upala, based in Ahmedabad, Gujarat, is a realist artist trained at C.N. Fine Arts College. His work captures human emotion, focusing on the silent struggles of homeless individuals and the fading warmth of childhood memories. Working primarily with pencil on paper, he uses the medium's subtlety and detail to convey vulnerability and depth. While experimenting with other materials, he returns to graphite to connect viewers with often-overlooked stories, fostering reflection, empathy, and a sense of shared humanity.

BADAL BAIRWA

Badal Bairwa's paintings draw from his childhood experiences around sewing machines and colorful bundles of thread. Inspired by moments of play, observing birds, and helping his father operate the machine, he captures these memories in oil paints. His work combines realism and miniature painting, emphasizing intricate details like thread balls and bird feathers. While some may view it as replication, he considers it a personal artistic creation, translating vivid childhood observations into detailed, expressive compositions.

BALARAM GOPE

Balaram Gope, from Paschim Barkola in Birbhum, West Bengal, draws inspiration from landscapes shaped by labor, industry, and time. Growing up in a coal-mining family, he witnessed the physical and psychological transformations of the land, which inform his practice. Using materials like coal, charcoal, jute sacks, and plastic tarps, he mirrors mining processes through scraping, layering, and removal. His work explores the fragile intersection of rural and industrial landscapes, memory and loss, and seeks to unearth overlooked stories and identities through painting and sculpture.

BAPAN SING

Bapan Sing's paintings explore the impact of industrial and urban life on rural environments. Born in the Sundarbans, he spent his early life immersed in nature, valuing simplicity and a close connection with the environment. His work reflects this duality, combining natural elements—often cow dung to represent traditional rural life—with disturbances introduced by urban influences. Drawing inspiration from daily life and surroundings, his practice examines the tension between simplicity and complexity, rural heritage and modern pressures.

BAPTU DEBNATH

Baptu Debnath, from Kumarghat in northern Tripura, creates landscape-based work exploring the relationship between humans and the natural world. Depicting land as "meat," he highlights the planet's vulnerability and sensitivity. Using cross-hatching and aerial perspective to create depth, he works with mud from excavated sites, incorporating animal bones and meat to explore transformation. His art juxtaposes natural and industrial elements, offering a commentary on human impact on the environment and drawing viewers into thought-provoking, immersive landscapes.



BHANU PRAKASH

Bhanu Prakash's watercolor series reflects on the transformation of human connection in the digital age. His work explores how intimate rituals—invitation, blessing, and personal interactions—have shifted into emojis, forwarded messages, and digital gestures, losing emotional depth. Using soft washes and fragmented forms, he contrasts the warmth of handmade, tactile experiences with the cold precision of digital life. Expanding to broader cultural practices, his paintings question what is lost when speed and convenience replace presence and authenticity.




BIKRAMJIT PAUL

Bikramjit Paul comes from a family of vegetable farmers and draws inspiration from agricultural life and local markets. Influenced by Rauschenberg, Richard Hamilton, and Indian miniature art, he uses photo transfer techniques on handmade surfaces to explore market dynamics and community life. Beginning during the lockdown with waste paper and household materials, his practice emphasizes sustainability and addresses plastic pollution. Through layered narratives combining imagery, materiality, and lived experience, his work reflects both environmental concerns and the rhythms of everyday rural and market life.

CHARUDATT PANDE

Charudatt Pande has spent six to seven years exploring migration and urbanization through his art. Initially focusing on everyday lives of street dwellers and small-business workers, he now examines broader urban transformations. After moving from a small town in Maharashtra to Pune, he was inspired by the contrast between his past and the city's evolving neighborhoods. His architectural series captures the juxtaposition of centuries-old wadas and modern businesses, reflecting nostalgia, urban change, and the silent stories embedded in these spaces.




CHETAN MEVADA

Chetan Mevada's practice explores the dialogue between heritage and modernity. In his series Fragments of Faith, he examines the shifting meaning of sacred forms in contemporary life. Drawing inspiration from architectural patterns in religious spaces, he deconstructs them into fragmented, abstract compositions. Through this approach, he questions how faith, identity, and tradition are reconstructed in today's world, often in broken or reconfigured forms. His work meditates on memory, erosion, and the visual remnants of belief.

DARSH MISTRY

Darsh Mistry works with traditional Indian art forms like Pichwai and miniature painting, using handmade wasli paper, natural pigments, and fine brushes. While respecting their history and depth, he brings a personal perspective through composition, symbolism, and brush rhythm. His subjects draw from nature, time, classical symbols, and still moments. Focused on detail and patience, his work remains anchored in tradition while speaking in a contemporary voice, creating meaningful, quiet, and honest pieces that reflect both his heritage and ongoing artistic exploration.



DEBOJIT ROY

Debojit Roy's practice centers on drawing, often responding to linear grids and abstract forms. Influenced by indigenous functional structures from semi-rural settlements, he derives sculptural designs from ethnographic objects like fish traps, bamboo frameworks for clay idols, and pandals. Using overlapping planes and structural logic, his works translate diagrams and objects into abstract, non-objective forms that suggest architectural blueprints while remaining independent compositions. Though connected to their sources, each drawing evolves into a self-contained work exploring form, construction, and spatial relationships.

DEEPIKA GARG

Deepika Garg's work is rooted in the belief that eternal happiness exists in the present moment, inspiring her artistic practice. She captures beauty and serenity from simple everyday experiences, primarily using pencil and charcoal. Pencil shading allows her to intricately construct compositions, exploring depth and complexity through countless shades of grey. Her process creates immersive works where time feels suspended, and the boundary between artist and artwork blurs, inviting viewers to reflect on the subtle, transient moments of life.

DR. NAZIA NAUREEN

Dr Nazia Naureen is a self-taught abstract artist working with acrylics and texture mediums to explore the unseen layers of human emotion. Her intuitive process begins with feeling rather than image, evolving through movement, pressure, and layering. Drawn to imperfections—cracks, scars, unfinished edges—she creates works that reflect struggle, healing, and growth. Through abstract forms, she invites viewers to connect with often-overlooked emotions, pause, and reflect, bridging the gap between inner experience, artistic form, and human empathy.

FALGUNI RAWAT

Falguni Rawat's practice explores the emotional weight of everyday life, focusing on uncertainty, stillness, and the unspoken. Using found and domestic materials, she creates forms reflecting personal narratives and psychological states. Influenced by still-life studies, she emphasizes composition, texture, and visual weight, employing mixed media like stitching, pigment, and ink. Her work, including Time Transformation, meditates on cycles of decay, resilience, and change, giving form to the invisible and capturing how fragments and materials carry traces of identity and becoming.

GAYATRI DANTHURI

Gayatri Danthuri views art as a reflection of life, exploring identity, memory, and the connection between nature and the human body. She incorporates entomological, anthropological, and botanical references to address human conditions often considered taboo, sometimes blending them into hybrid forms. Her practice emphasizes color experimentation, capturing iridescent hues and their response to light and perception. Working primarily in aquatint and woodcut, she uses these mediums to explore sensuality, vigor, and transformation, creating work that dialogues between human experience and organic processes.

GENIUS CHAKMA

Genius Chakma's work uses symbolic figures as vessels stripped of ego and identity, allowing viewers to project their inner worlds. Withholding facial features and gestures, his drawings emphasize universal states of stillness, silence, and solitude across cultures and histories. Focusing on monks' culture, his meticulously crafted works explore the teachings of Siddhartha (Buddha), spirituality, and philosophy. Through immersive, interactive lines and three-dimensional experiences, the series invites contemplative engagement, connecting intellect, reality, and the subconscious while highlighting the quiet thread of human desire for presence and peace.

HIMANI PASRICHA

Himani Pasricha explores energy, chakras, and human emotions in her series Freedom in Motion. Using delicate white dots, she depicts a dancing woman in flowing drapes symbolizing the responsibilities and relationships that bind her. The scattering dots signify worries dissolving, while the black background represents repelling negativity. Her work captures the transition from confinement to liberation, with white hues embodying peace and clarity. Through this visual journey, she celebrates the resilience, strength, and inner light of the feminine spirit.

JENISH VAGH

Jenish Vagh uses humor, satire, and metaphor in the titles of his sculptures to explore humanity's dominance over nature, animals, and plants. His work subtly critiques human manipulation of the natural world, raising ethical questions about intervention and responsibility. By blending playful language with serious reflection, he encourages viewers to consider the broader impact of human actions on the environment. Through this approach, his practice provokes thought while offering a critical yet accessible perspective on the human-nature relationship.

JIGNESH MAKWANA

Jignesh Makwana draws on his experiences growing up in an impoverished environment to explore social disparity and cyclical patterns of life. His art gives voice to the dilemmas, despair, joys, and hopes of marginalized communities. Early observations of poverty, family struggles, and the repetitive nature of societal systems inform his practice, often reflected in repeating motifs that convey stasis and resilience. Through his work, he transforms personal and collective experiences into visual narratives that highlight both hardship and aspiration.

JUNAKI PAUL

Junaki Paul's series explores the relationship between human experience and the vastness of the universe, drawing from dreams and quiet introspection. Using black pen, charcoal, white ink, and yellow pigment on handmade paper, she employs a minimal yet emotional visual language. Recurring motifs—hands, stars, flowers, fragile lines, and comets—symbolize memory, desire, connection, and life's impermanence. Her work gives form to unspoken emotions, reflecting the weight of silence, the glow of hope, and the fragility of existence.




SOVAN BAG





SUSMITA SADHUKHAN








SUSMITA SINGHA ROY






VIPIN SINGH RAJPUT
